


WINTER 2022

It's been a cold start to 2022, but there is a lot of activity at Spring Mill State Park. The winter crew is getting many projects done throughout the park. One we will all notice this year is that the grist mill in the village will be shut down due to a broken shaft on the wheel. The museum in the building will still be open. The sawmill will be operating at times, however. Some other projects include replacing a comfort station in the campground, laying cable near the village, and installing new windows in part of the Grissom Memorial. Along with many other projects!

Winter is a great time to visit the park. Some days are very quiet, and the only sounds heard are the occasional calls of birds or the hammering of a woodpecker. There are very few people on the trails, as noted in the picture of Trail 3 with no footprints in the newly fallen snow! The forest looks beautiful as the sun sparkles on the ice and snow.

Pioneer Village Print Shop

Paul Sanders has been busy in the Pioneer Village Print Shop thanks to several grants and his vast knowledge of the printing processes of the 1800's.

Thousands of people have visited the shop and seen Paul at work, focusing "on the period process of letterpress printing and elements of printing that served to inform the communities and citizens through the printed word during a time before other forms of media were not widespread."

The print shop is located in the Mill Office behind the upper residence.

The Friends of Spring Mill State Park provided some startup funds and grants from the Lawrence County Community Foundation and The Orange County REMC's Operation Roundup have greatly boosted funding for the items needed to establish the print shop.

Paul shares that many visitors have told stories of printing industry experiences, from times working in print shops, or taking classes in school, or in other aspects of their life. Paul also states there is a "story of a retired printing instructor of 37 years who is being given the chance of a lifetime to resurrect skills and memories of the things he taught some 40 years ago."

Fall Craft Show

A beautiful late fall weekend helped draw a big crowd to the Craft Show held in the Village in November.

The Friends of Spring Mill State Park paired up with the Lawrence County Tourism Office and Spring Mill State Park staff to host the crowd-pleasing event.

Twenty-four vendors were very happy with the outcome of sales of various items from floral arrangements to syrup to jewelry to knitted items to wood crafts and many other crafts too numerous to mention! There was even a waiting list of vendors wanting to participate!

Attendees paid a \$3 entrance fee to get in the village. The ticket was good for the entire weekend. The vendors also paid a participation fee.

Floating Bridge

A number of years ago (won't say how many since I can remember this!), the public was able to walk along a pier that ran from the shore area in back of the nature center to the cement platform in the lake. Many people fished from the pier, and just enjoyed the different perspective you get of the lake from being out in the middle of it! But due to age and flooding, the pier was removed, and the platform has become an island where an occasional goose makes its nest.

The picture below is from an old postcard. Pictured is the current Nature Center (then it was a bath house) and the swimming/beach area. The diving platform in the water is what is still in the water. But in the near future, with help from the Friends of Spring Mill State Park, a \$5000 donation from the Mitchell VFW Post 9107, and additional fund-raising efforts, a floating bridge will connect the platform with the shore once again! Plans are in the works for installing a floating bridge to allow guests of the park access to the cement platform once again. The lake will not be open for swimming or diving, but guests will be able to walk out on the floating bridge and enjoy the view or catch a fish!

It's easy to pull and if bagged and removed we think we can keep the invasive under control, but it takes an on-going effort. Last year we had 42 people come out and help pull and bag mustard and then the Friends provided lunch to the volunteers. That's the plan again this year. Come join us to pull mustard, or to fix lunch for the volunteers.

Kick off Spring with Walking Week

Spring Mill State Park, the Friends of Spring Mill State Park, and the Bedford Hiking Club are celebrating Walking Week April 1-7, 2022 with a lineup of hikes to kick off spring.

Teena Ligman, President of Friends of Spring Mill State Park, said there will be a different hike each of the seven days of various length and over different types of terrain, and at different times of the day; to have something for everyone. "We want people to get outside and start walking and then keep walking right through the rest of the year. Ideally we'd like to see people make walking outdoors a part of their lives."

- . The schedule for the week is:
- Friday, April 1- 10 am Meet at the Spring Mill pool parking lot to hike the scenic 2-mile Mountain Bike Trail.
- Friday, April 1, 3 pm Meet in the parking lot behind the Paynetown State Recreation Area off SR 446 south of Bloomington. The group will have the option to hike the 6.2-mile (10K) or a 3.1 (5K) hike on the Pate Hollow Trail. This is considered a

volkswalk but anyone is welcome to join us.

- Saturday, April 2, 10 am Members from the Bedford Hiking Club will lead two groups on the Spring Mill Volkswalk. There will be 10K (6.2 mile) and 5K (3.1 mile) hikes offered. Meet in the lobby of the Spring Mill Inn for the volkswalk hikes. The volkswalk includes Trail 3, Trail 5, and parts of Trail 4 and 2.
- Saturday, April 2, 3pm Meet at the Nature Center to hike Trail 2, Trail 1 and part of Trail 4 along the lake. (Approximately 1 1/4 mile).
- Sunday, April 3, 1 pm Meet at the Lakeview Activity Center to hike Trail 5. (1 mile)
- Monday, April 4, 3 pm Meet at the Grissom Memorial parking area to hike Trail 6. (1/4 mile)
- Monday, April 4, 5:30 Meet the Bedford Hiking Club at Friendship Park on Main Street in Mitchell (across from the Railroad Café) to hike the Blue Jacket Trail with the Bedford Hiking Club. (2.6 mile) The Bedford Hiking Club does weekly walks. This is an opportunity to meet the group, and maybe start a new weekly routine of walking with them in interesting places.

- Tuesday, April 5, 10 am Meet at the Tulip Poplar Shelter house to hike Trail 7 and the Stagecoach Trail. (2 1/4 mile)
- Wednesday, April 6 at 9 am Meet near the restrooms at the Donaldson Shelter Parking Lot to hike Trail 4. (2 mile)
- Thursday, April 7 at 1 pm Meet at the Twin Caves Parking Lot for a hike on Trail 3 (2.5 miles)

Ligman encourages people to come out the first week of April not only to enjoy Spring, but it's an opportunity to walk every trail in the park, meet some new friends, see spring wildflowers and enjoy the outdoors. She noted even if you aren't able to come every day, you'll have gotten a good start on completing the Challenge, and be more motivated to come back and finish.

This spring is a good time to get started on the Spring Mill Trail Challenge. You can make great progress during the National Walking Week, but you can start any time, and just keep walking! During National Walking Week, hikes will be led on every trail in the park.

Once a hiker has completed each of the 9 trails in the park, they are eligible to purchase a Trail Challenge T-shirt (see the Friends Facebook or webpage for more information), as well as a free sticker. But there's no time limit on the challenge. You can take your time and when you've got them done, you're eligible for a Tshirt and sticker for the year you completed the challenge.

All proceeds from the purchase of a Trail Challenge T-shirt go to support the Park. The park encourages visitors to do the challenge every year as the park is always changing and each time you walk a trail you will likely see something you didn't notice before.

Help is needed on the highway cleanup! This is done four times a year. Once again, contact Teena for a date and time.


